accomplishments highlighted in this Annual Report. You will learn about numerous awards and recognitions achieved by our dedicated students, faculty, and staff, and you will see examples of our commitment to working with business and industry to help develop their workforce.

Of all the achievements during the past year, the most satisfying was seeing our students walk across the graduation stage. In fact, we set an all-time record with 1,498 certificates and degrees awarded in 2017-18 at a time when student success remains a priority and our graduation rate continues to improve. Thirty four percent of our first-time, full-time freshmen graduated or transferred within three years, and 77 percent of first-time Chattanooga State students—both part-time and full-time—graduated or transferred within six years.

I am proud that our students receive a quality education at Chattanooga State where we have a student-to-teacher ratio of 18:1, a job placement rate of 97 percent, and a licensure pass rate of 98 percent.

Thank you for being a part of the Chattanooga State success story where we remain committed to high-quality education and workforce training, 53 years and counting.





Tasked with enhancing economic and workforce development throughout the region, the Division of Economic and Workforce Development provided 60,451 workforce training hours in fiscal year 17-18—a 16 percent increase over the previous fiscal year.



Total Scholarships \$1,097,780

Chattanooga State awarded \$339,850 from the Chattanooga State Foundation combined with \$757,930 in institutional scholarships. These funds were awarded to 221 students from the more than 120 named scholarships offered within the Chattanooga State Foundation.

Total Voluntary Support \$1,082,307

Chattanooga State once again exceeded \$1 million in total voluntary support, an accomplishment attained for three of the past four years. The college also received a record pledge of \$1.5 million to our nursing program, the largest pledge to date.




New Named Scholarship

One of the newest named scholarships established was the Tom Edd Wilson First in the Family Endowed Scholarship at \$50,000. Tom Edd passed away suddenly on June 10th, 2017. His legacy of "giving back" lives on with the newly endowed Tom Edd Wilson First in the Family Scholarship. He provided strong, competent leadership for Chattanooga's most significant fundraising efforts including the Allied Arts of Greater Chattanooga, the United Way of Greater Chattanooga, and the Friends of Scouting Campaign for several years.

Employee giving participation up 45%

Employee giving participation grew by 45 percent to 338 donors for fiscal year 2017-18 and raising \$42,885.



Polytech Academy Grant

As part of a \$956,809 Labor Education Alignment Program (LEAP) grant, the Polytech Academy at Chattanooga State Kimball received new computer stations, 3D printers and scanners, as well as an injection mold system for the classroom, creating a perfect learning environment for students. Polytech students will complete their high school graduation requirements while earning 40 or more credit hours toward their Associate of Applied Science degree.

Dinner of Firsts

Chattanooga State's Dinner of Firsts 2017 was once again a resounding success! Net proceeds for the event totaled more than \$70,000 with \$50,000 earmarked for the inaugural Tom Edd Wilson First in the Family Endowed Scholarship and \$20,000 to the annual First in the Family Scholarship. Earnings from the first six years have provided more than \$340,000 in scholarship support for first-generation college students.





Helping Hands Fund Created

Thanks to a donor who understands how poverty can impact the success of students, the Chattanooga State Foundation Helping Hands Fund was created to support students in a crisis to ensure they can stay in school.

\$5 Million in Public Grants

We are proud that Chattanooga State secured competitive public grants totaling \$5,255,240, including a \$200,000 Tennessee Promise Forward Grant to support student persistence, retention, and graduation.

We dedicated the Associated General Contractors of East Tennessee Construction Lab at Chattanooga State in recognition of their \$150,000 donation to the Chattanooga State Foundation.


