What an amazing transformation it was!



Jim Fry not only succeeded, he blossomed! He was a Global Scholars honors student and Beacon Scholar. He helped establish a new student club for adults. He was named the first-ever Community College Student of the Year by the College System of Tennessee! To cap off his tenure at Chattanooga State, Jim delivered the keynote address at his commencement ceremony, where he and his classmates made history as a record number of graduates crossed the stage to receive their degrees.

Setting a record for graduates reflects our focus on improving the lives of our students and the prosperity of our community. Thanks to the hard work and dedication of our outstanding faculty and staff, the transformation underway is evident by the achievements noted throughout this Annual Report. I am proud to see more of our students staying in school, graduating, or transferring after graduation. We have seen a 19 percent increase in graduates from low income households over the past four years. When combined with our 98 percent job placement rate, our students are on a transformational journey that will improve their lives and the lives they touch.

My hope is that all of us at Chattanooga State will be the chrysalis our students need—that they may have the nurturing surroundings necessary to fully grow, learn, and transform their lives for the betterment of their families and our entire community.

The Tennessee Small Business Development Center Supports Regional Startups

The Tennessee Small Business Development Center (TSBDC) in Chattanooga provides small business start-up services including, but not limited to: business plan development, financial planning assistance, marketing plan development, sources of capital, & social media guidance to a nine-county region.

In 2018-2019 TSBDC served 503 small business clients, up from 400 previous year, with 2,032 counseling and research hours producing 289 jobs created or retained and \$25,493,015 in capital infusion—the highest amount among the TSBDC statewide combined total of \$101M. Further, 1,121 individuals attended 131 seminars on topics such as HR, bookkeeping, legal matters, marketing, and more.

Chattanooga State Wins Outstanding Workforce Development Award

The Economic and Workforce Development Division of Chattanooga State Community College was named the 2018 recipient of the Outstanding

Workforce Development Award from the Community Colleges of Appalachia (CCA) during the 28th Annual Conference in Asheville, NC.



The winning entry, "New Learners from Old Friends," focused on Chattanooga State's longstanding partnership with Whirlpool Corporation to describe how the college was able to develop retraining solutions for their workforce who would be working with stateof-the-art robotic and mechatronic systems in a new \$200 million plant. The challenge was to get the workforce up to speed while maintaining current operations.

Chattanooga Chamber and Chattanooga State Partner to Expand Apprenticeships in Community

In recognition of National Apprenticeship Week, the Chattanooga Area Chamber of Commerce and Chattanooga State Community College announced a partnership to work together with business, industry and other educational partners to grow apprenticeship programs in our service area.

"The **'earn while you learn'** apprenticeship model shows that 9 out of 10 apprentices are employed after completing their apprenticeship with an average salary of \$60K per year," stated ChattState President Dr. Rebecca Ashford.

Card-Monroe Lab Dedication

President Rebecca Ashford officially welcomed local dignitaries, Card-Monroe officials, faculty, staff, and students on February 6, 2019 to recognize the Card-Monroe Corp. for its generous \$100,000 donation to the Chattanooga State Foundation. This gift helped to equip a state-of-the-art learning lab in the college's Center for Engineering, Technology, Arts & Sciences (CETAS) building and is designed to provide hands-on training for current and future students at Chattanooga State.



Chattanooga State's Dinner of Firsts

2018 was once again a resounding success! Proceeds for the event totaled over \$77,000 with \$46,000 going to the Tom Edd Wilson First in the Family Endowed Scholarship and \$31,000 to the annual First in the Family Scholarship.

This seventh annual dinner event honored local community leader and Chattanooga State graduate David Wade with Reggie Piercy serving as event Chair. David is also the President & CEO of EPB. Those roasting David included Todd Crawford, Joe Ferguson, Richard Rogers, Steve Rogers, Justin Wade, and Aaron Webb. Jed Mescon served as the Master of Ceremonies.

\$626,624 Childcare Access Grant Awarded to ChattState

Chattanooga State was awarded a \$626,624 competitive grant through the U.S. Department of Education's 2018 Child Care Access Means Parents in School grant program (CCAMPIS). The grant supports the expansion of Chattanooga State's daycare program into the evening hours while also providing daycare expense assistance for low income student parents for anytime our campus daycare center is open.

By using part of the grant to supplement the expenses of low-income student parents who were previously turned away from the CDC, it translates into allowing nearly 100 new student parents to pursue their education each year. This initiative is projected to serve more than 400 learners by 2022 when the grant ends.
